



The new wave of government reform

The challenge for the UK is to rescue its public finances and reform public services. New Zealand is an international model of best practice. This report will investigate the latest New Zealand

reforms and draw conclusions for the UK.

Reducing demand: health

This paper will challenge the idea that healthcare must place an ever-greater demand on the

taxpayer. Research will consider the role of "expert patients" and reform to the provision of health

services.

Reducing demand: criminal justice

This paper will start from the fact that overall crime has fallen by a half over the last 20 years. In

that time, society has become much more effective at defending its property. It will also consider

new approaches by the police to achieving safety, rather than simply fighting crime.

Reducing demand: education

This paper will consider the possible success of the "troubled families" initiative in reducing

demand for welfare systems. It will also investigate "tiger mums", i.e. the new efforts by parents to

support their children's education, complementary to schools.

The savings revolution

This paper will examine the introduction of auto-enrolment into workplace pensions in the UK and

its role in delivering better pension outcomes. It will contrast the UK experience with another "soft

compulsion" system, the Kiwisaver scheme in New Zealand.

How to run a country

This book of essays will propose new thinking on the institutional structure of good government,

covering Parliament, the Civil Service, fiscal rules, localism and the progress of reform under the

Coalition Government. It will be followed by three research reports later in the year; on the

structure of government, progress with deregulation and the future of localism.

The future of health provision

This report will look at progress of reform and productivity improvement in the NHS and the opportunities to deliver service change at pace and scale in the next Parliament.

From light to darkness

Following widespread and successful privatisation of the UK energy market, liberalisation in this industry has been progressively undermined over recent years. This paper will review the Government's programme of Electricity Market Reform, which has the explicit goal of replacing the market with central control, and explore alternative ways to meet the Government's triple ambition to keep the lights on, bills down and the air clean.

Fire and Rescue Service Workforce Reform

There has been a significant reduction in demand for fire and rescue services. This As identified by Sir Ken Knight last year, net spending has not fallen in line with reduced demand. This research will evaluate the potential of a more flexible workforce to provide an efficient and a more cost effective service to the public

A market-based middle tier for schools

As schools convert to academy status and become more autonomous, there are questions about how best to promote innovation and collaboration. Most schools do not use the freedom they have been given, which inhibits their potential for improvement. In this report Matt Robb of The Parthenon Group will argue that the creation of a "middle tier" of school chains would encourage innovation and generate the economies of scale that allow it.

The productivity paradox

This paper will explore the reasons why private sector productivity has remained weak, despite economic growth, while public sector productivity has finally started to improve after decades of stagnation.
